Perth Waterfront Fig Tree National Shame, 7am, Saturday, 16th June 2012

Most of Perth was asleep whilst contractors were mobilized in the dark in preparation for a shameful act that was to be committed right in the heart of our City. The 8 foot tall total block-out fence concealed a living treasure that was about to be destroyed. A 600 tonne ancient Moreton Bay Fig tree, a public asset and a spectacular example of public art was about to be dismembered and shredded through a wood-chipper.

What local or state government would condone the wood-chipping of 600 tonnes of ancient tree? What Heritage Council or Heritage Minister would not value a giant ancient treasure? What Planning Minister would allow the destruction of a beautiful landmark tree? What architects and planners would not value and plan around a supreme example of natural public art?

Shame on our City's modern fathers that they still can't understand the true value of a tree. There were no good engineering and environmental reasons for not keeping this tree. What a lack of imagination, good will and common sense that they could not incorporate this tree as a feature of the development. Our architects, planners and administrators should hang their heads in shame!
